Engaging With Israel

t was easy for me to fall in love with Israel, coming of age in the 1990s. I was inspired by the egalitarian army service and the rescue of Ethiopian Jews. I mourned when Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin was assassinated and joined with the majority of Jews in the US and Israel in keeping hope that Israeli and Palestinian leaders could achieve peace in the near future.

I'm not exactly sure how it happened, but despite identifying as a Zionist my entire life and even having worked for the Israeli government as an emissary, it has been a decade since I've been to Israel! While I have used beginning a career and a family as an excuse, I recently read an essay that made me reevaluate my relationship with Israel. Dr. Joshua Holo, Dean of Hebrew Union College in LA, suggests in "Peering into the Nationalist Mirror" that American Jews are increasingly conflicted

between their Zionism and liberalism and are increasingly choosing to identify with the later. If you were to ask me if my Zionist identity has dwindled, my knee jerk reaction would be "absolutely not," but my actions show my favoritism. My engagement with Israel has decreased while my involvement in social justice causes here in the US has increased. I wonder how many of you have experienced something similar?

American Jews are increasingly conflicted between their Zionism and liberalism and are increasingly choosing to identify with the later.

> As a rabbinic leader committed to *ahavat Tzion* love of Israel — as a core Reform Jewish value, I have to be honest with myself and think deeply about why I have not prioritized Israel more in my life. In addition to *ahavat Tzion*, our Reform Movement embraces informed choice. If you are like me and may have lost some connection with Israel



and Zionism, I want to invite you to engage with Israel along with me this month.

I'm proud to travel to Israel and represent Temple Beth Or and all of Washington State on an intimate delegation through the

> Jewish National Fund with Consul General of Israel Shlomi Koffman who serves Northern California and the

Pacific Northwest. I'll post regularly while traveling and share articles and resources to help us better understand the beauty and complexities of Israel at age 70. Friend me on Facebook if you would like to "join" me on this journey to Israel.

Life & Legacy — Temple Beth Or's Future

How do you express your commitment to your Jewish community? What can you do for future generations to ensure that Temple Beth Or is here for them? The Life & Legacy program encourages Temple Beth Or Members to designate a gift to Temple Beth Or in their estate planning to fund an endowment that will insure the future financial stability of Temple Beth Or. The program is sponsored by the Harold Grinspoon Foundation and the Jewish Federation of Greater Seattle.

We are currently in the third year of a four year program. In the first two years, TBO has benefited in the amount of \$17,500 by having 41 members sign letters of intent to designate a gift to TBO in their wills. This year we will be asking more members to sign letters of intent and confirming that members have actually made the changes to their wills or otherwise designated a gift to TBO from other investment vehicles.

The Life & Legacy Committee will be hosting an adult education session on the "ins and outs" of estate planning on Sunday, January 6, from 2:00 to 3:30 p.m. at the Temple. Temple Beth Or Religious School is in full-swing, with over 40 students attending on a weekly basis filling every nook and cranny of the building and portables. Students participate in two hours of Jewish studies and 90 minutes of Hebrew as they prepare for their bar and bat mitzvot. However, connection with the school does not end when they leave the *bimah*. For the third year in a row, we have welcomed post-bar and bat mitzvah grads as *madrichim* (teachers) within the school. Their responsibilities include assisting teachers, working with students on Hebrew, and the ensuring that the ever-critical snack is delivered to classrooms. As new *madrichim* Lily Center said, "I like to work with my friends to help with projects around Temple." Maddie Center concurred, "I like being active in synagogue life after my bat mitzvah."

BOTY is BACK!

These three words were met with a round of applause at the NFTY-NW (National Federation of Temple Youth—Northwest) Leadership Retreat in September. BOTY (Beth Or Temple Youth) is the Temple Youth Group for our synagogue. BOTY started over 20 years ago and many of its former members served in both local and regional leadership roles. However, a lack of high school age participants forced BOTY into hiatus. There is good news, though! With our students getting older, and new families joining Beth Or, BOTY was revived in the fall.

We have had two events already. We took a trip to a very cold, dark, and sort of spooky corn maze in October. Then we held our largest event, with over 15 participants working together to "flee the facility" at Escape Scene (an escape room game) in Everett. Coming up in 2019, we will continue to offer events for students in grades 8 and up.

Not to be outdone, Jr. BOTY is also starting. Geared towards students in grades 6-8, events include Neon Night at Altitude Trampoline Park in December. More events will continue for this cohort in 2019 as well.

The Social Action Committee is once again hosting the Temple Beth Or Tu B'Shevat Seder Friday, January 25, 7:00 p.m. at the synagogue. Through the generations Tu B'Shevat, the New Year of Trees, has evolved from marking the start of a new fiscal year for tithe on fruit trees, to being a Zionist holiday emphasizing tree planting in Israel, to its most recent incarnation as a Jewish Earth Day promoting environmentalism.

At this year's Seder a "Tu 'Bee' Shevat-Shabbat Experience," we will highlight the important role bees play in keeping our planet healthy and how the recent bee blight threatens the viability of the ecosystem. The seder will also include some elements of a typical Friday night Shabbat service such as candle lighting and a Mourner's Kaddish.

Social Action News

Tzedakah Box Recipient: The Tzedakah Box recipient for January – March 2019 is the Interfaith Association of Northwest Washington. Temple Beth Or has been a long-time supporter and partner with the Association which envisions a world in which faith groups and other community members are united in action to ensure that families experiencing homelessness have access to the economic, social, and holistic support needed to overcome poverty and thrive. The Association operates a family shelter to help stabilize families experiencing homelessness with safe and secure housing. Since 2011, 179 families, including 329 children, have found support at Interfaith's Family Shelter.

Interfaith Association of Northwest Washington Family

Shelter: In addition to financial support, volunteers are needed to help cook dinners at the Interfaith Family Shelter, located in Everett, on Saturday and Sunday evenings. The Social Action Committee's goal is to sign up enough TBO volunteers to be able to commit to provide this service to the shelter 6-8 times in 2019. The family shelter typically has about 20 people living there at any one time. Most days the families prepare their own meals but the Association would like to provide them a break by recruiting volunteers to do dinner preparation on weekends. The food is provided by the Association. Volunteers coordinate with the Association to find out what food is available for their dinner to help them decide what the menu would be. An Association staff member will be on site to provide support with the meal preparation. Ideally, at least 2-3 volunteers would work on each meal. Volunteers not only prepare the meal but then enjoy the fruit of their efforts by sitting down with the shelter residents to eat the dinner, making this an excellent opportunity for families to volunteer as a unit.
