
One of my favorite stories

As Honi walked on past the man planting, he began to feel very tired, so he decided to stop and take a nap. When Honi awoke, he noticed a beautiful mature carob tree and someone was picking the fruit. "Excuse me sir, did you plant this tree?" Honi asked.

"Not me, my grandfather planted it seventy years ago."

Sometimes returning back to the Pacific Northwest after 20 years away feels like I have only just awoken from a really long nap. Working in the Jewish world and having my daughter attend preschool at the synagogue where I grew up, I run into someone I haven't seen since I was a child about once a week. Interfaith Association of Northwest Washington Family Shelter:

At least five volunteers are desired to help prepare dinner for about 30 people at the shelter Sunday, February 10, 5:00 pm. Don't despair if you want to perform this *mitzvah* but are not able to do so on Feb. 10. There will be other opportunities as we would like to be able to perform this *mitzvah* several times in 2019. Please contact Social Action Committee members Nancy Wilkinson or Naomi Katsh Barger if you can help out on February 10 or some other time in 2019.

The family shelter typically has about 20 people living there at any one time. Most days the families prepare their own meals but the Association would like to provide them a break by recruiting volunteers to do dinner preparation on weekends. The food is provided by the Association. Volunteers coordinate with the Association to find out what food is available for their dinner to help them decide what the menu would be. An Association staff member will be on site to provide support with the meal preparation. Ideally, at least 2-3 volunteers would work on each meal. Volunteers not only prepare the meal but then enjoy the fruit of their efforts by sitting down with the shelter residents to eat the dinner, making this an excellent opportunity for families to volunteer as a unit.

If cooking isn't your thing, there are other volunteer opportunities at the shelter. One specific need is for volunteers to help with the shelter's after school homework club which takes place 4:30-5:30 pm Monday-Friday. This is an opportunity to help elementary and middle school-age students who live at the shelter. Once again, contact Nancy or Naomi if you're interested in helping out.

Temple Parking Lot Changes

Construction work has begun on the property across the alley from the Temple parking area. While this project may disrupt traffic in and out of the alley, we have the opportunity to take advantage of our under-utilized parking area. The construction company has leased 12 of our 16 parking spaces for their use during the week -Monday morning through Friday. We will maintain full use of the parking lot from Friday after 5:00pm through Sunday. Services and all Sunday activities will not be interrupted or inconvenienced. We will be compensated nicely for this use of our space. The Goodmarks' space will be made available during the week for those attending weekday meetings, if they are not attending those meetings. The president's space will be available for the year to those with handicapped placards. The Wexlers' space will be available January 25—March 15. Committee chairs holding meetings during the week are asked to specify whether the meeting is upstairs or downstairs so those with physical limitations can park accordingly. Also, our lease agreement specifically excludes mid-week High Holy Days. While there may be some inconvenience related to this one-year arrangement, the Governing Board is confident that it will be well worth the compensation and positive relationship it will engender.
