Small Groups - Staying Together while Keeping Apart - FAQ

What is the Small Group Initiative at Temple Beth Or?

The TBO Small Groups Initiative is a campaign designed to build relationships around meaningful topics. It is a conversation based activity with the goal of helping members gain new connections with each other.

Who are in these Groups and how are they formed?

We will ask for members to volunteer as discussion hosts, and invite members to join them. Members will have the opportunity to volunteer as a host or a participant. "Host" is an acronym:

- ${\bf H}$ Heart for Discussion
- **0** Online Bravery
- ${\bf S}$ Set the Environment
- T Turn on the Discussion!

Where will the discussions be held?

Discussions will be entirely online, held via Zoom, Facebook Messenger, or whatever digital medium the host and group are most comfortable using.

When will they be held?

It is the goal of the Small Groups team that discussions be held monthly. The campaign will run for approximately four months, then groups can be reformed so that members have the opportunity to connect with new people.

How will we know what to talk about?

There will be a discussion topic given each month with focus questions for the group to discuss. Rabbi Kort will present a short 3-5 minute video (available on the TBO website) each month to help support your conversation. We expect the conversations to last no more than 40 minutes, the amount of time for a free Zoom call.

Why are we doing this?

Small Groups are being formed in a number of Union for Reform Judaism Congregations throughout North America. It is our hope that by joining this initiative, we will give our members a new way to connect and form deeper relationships with each other. Small groups - staying together while keeping apart!

At the August Governing Board (GB) meeting the following business occurred and information was shared.

- 1. All are urged to make sure activities are on the TBO calendar by emailing activities to calendar@templebethor.org.
- 2. Fence bids are still in process.
- 3. The GB approved the purchase of 20 new cemetery plots for our area at the GAR Cemetery (TBO had only 20 left unsold).
- 4. The GB, with COVID-19 Task Force input, has decided that we will not allow food to be brought into the Temple when we first open the time of which has not yet been determined. The COVID-19 Task Force is just about ready to go on a hiatus until the situation regarding social distancing changes. Note from the President: They have done an amazing job!
- 5. Committees are urged to not ask the Rabbi for funds for unanticipated programming. The Temple is able to accommodate reasonable changes to the budget in order to take advantage of opportunities. Requests should go to the Finance Committee.
- 6. TBO has received \$4,000 this year from the Harold Grinspoon Foundation for achieving the incentive goals of the LIFE & LEGACY program.
- Strategic Planning has made some initial recommendations regarding community building. Recommendations include: A. developing a media strategy
 - B. enhance and increase spiritual and social gatherings
 - C. strategies to attract and engage families with children
 - D. outreach efforts for 21-36 year old people
 - E. recognizing and reinforcing Mitzvah Corps
 - F. continuing Social Action Committee programming.

- Tikkun Olam transforming ourselves and our world through tzedakah (fairness), social justice, and g'milut chasadim (acts of loving kindness).
