

Justice and Equity in Our Jewish Tradition

I am proud that Temple Beth Or is joining the national and global movement of learning and engagement around diversity, equity, and inclusion. While these concepts are new to many of us, they embrace our ancient and essential Jewish value of pursuing justice. Our tradition's idea of *tzedek*, Hebrew for "justice," is tied to an understanding of equity.

You might be familiar with the following illustration of equity by Dr. Craig Froehle, professor of business at the University of Cincinnati.



Our rabbinic tradition (c. 5th Century) describes equity through the following example using camels instead of a baseball game.

"Justice, justice you shall pursue," Deuteronomy 16:20. The first use of the word tzedek, "justice," refers to a decision based on strict law; the second is a compromise. How so? If two camels met each other while on an ascent, perhaps to Beth-Horon; if they both ascend at the same time both may tumble down into the valley; but if they ascend after each other both can go up safely. How then should they act when ascending? If one is laden and the other unladen, the latter should give way to the former. If one is nearer to its destination than the other, the former should give way to the latter. If both are equally near or far from

their destination, make a compromise between them. The one which is to go forward compensating the other which has to give way. (Babylonian Talmud, Sanhedrin 23a).

In this Talmudic illustration one component of justice is equity. In order for all of us to ascend, thrive, and selfactualize, we have to compromise and help each other carry our burdens.

I recently read a critique of Craig Froehle's equity illustration by the organization Cultural Organizing. This critique applies to our sages' camel illustration too. The reason that some people have more difficulty seeing the baseball game than others is not because of their height, but because of the context around them. The issue is not height, but the barrier that has been placed in front of them. In the case of the camels, each camel is burdened with a different load.

The artist and organizer, Paul Kutner, offers a variation of the equity fence illustration, portraying his idea of justice. In order to bring about justice, we must work to break down the structures that cause inequity.

Upholding justice by

rebuilding the structures in our society is



daunting work. I find comfort in knowing that this work of re-creation is familiar to our sacred stories of creation. Our tradition teaches that God did not get the creation of humanity right on the first try. Violence filled the world and God felt the need to start over. saving Noah and his family to rebuild society (Genesis 6). The Torah tells us that God chose Noah because he was a tzadik, a righteous person. Tzadik is related to the word tzedek, justice. For God in the story of Noah the value most important to uphold when rebuilding our broken world was righteousness or justice and according to our sages, justice is equity.

Our Jewish community is a diverse community. It is imperative that we address equity and inclusion both within and as a part of our greater society. This work is also Jewish work because it supports our core Jewish value of pursuing justice. As we commit ourselves to learning about diversity, equity, and inclusion through the DEI Challenge. I want to invite us to see this work as essential lewish work. contextualized with the following blessing:

We praise You, Eternal God, Sovereign of the universe, who calls us to holiness through *mitzvot*, commanding us to pursue *tzedek*/justice.

Inspiring Words

Recently our Social Action Committee (SAC) encouraged me to check out a link on the Union for Reform Iudaism (URJ) Religious Action Center (RAC) page. This was a truly inspirational read for me. The RAC page entitled "Bringing Social Justice Into Your Congregation" can be seen as a call to action. The article found at https://rac.org/ bringing-social-justice-vourcongregation identifies six areas that can help us to become a k'hilat tzedek, a community of justice. Our track record on these items at TBO varies: there are the ones that are fully integrated into our TBO culture, the ones we are working on, and the areas we have yet to address.

The six areas the article listed are:

- 1. Accessibility making all of our services and activities available to all, regardless of their abilities.
- 2. Community Investment investing capital in the redevelopment of a community.
- 3. Environmental
 Considerations considering
 the environmental impacts of
 our operations including
 purchasing, landscaping,
 waste reduction, energy
 conservation, recycling,
 transportation, etc., and
 promoting environmental
 awareness.
- 4. Labor Matters treating and paying employees fairly.
- 5. Outreach to Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual and Transgender Jews – considering the needs of LGBTQ+ Jews as we create

programming.

6. Members' Sensitivity with Financial Needs – providing equitable sacred commitments relief and assistance for other program expenses in a way that protects those struggling financially from embarrassment.

I would suggest perhaps the addition of a #7 dealing with inclusion and welcoming of Jews of color. I encourage you to read this article to see the full discussion. Which of these areas speak to you as an individual? Think about the areas listed above (and maybe others) that you would like to see us embrace or tackle, as a community in the coming months and years.

One effort currently underway at TBO to make us more k'hilat tzedek is the Equity Challenge, being organized jointly by the SAC and the Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) Task Force. This 10-week program involves a weekly topic. Those who wish to join need to register: information is in ORbits or contact the office to do so. Registration is open throughout the program. The Monday of each week participants will receive materials, videos, articles, etc. related to the topic of the week. On Sunday afternoon there will be discussions around the week's issue. You can participate in whatever manner suits your life. You are welcome to engage in whatever way you can. We hope you will go for all of it! This program is intended to

make us all re-think how we view and approach the world. It



promises to be thought provoking, most likely difficult, and potentially uncomfortable. Perhaps we have all been a little too comfortable and now is the time to challenge that. Our Mission Statement directs us to pursue *tikkun olam*. This program is a great way to continue that journey.

Feel free to reach out to the appropriate committee/task force chairs or me to share your thoughts on these matters. Maybe you will be inspired to start some new habits at home, work, or school, promote an activity within the TBO community, or maybe even choose to join our SAC or DEI Task Force. They are always happy to welcome new members and ideas.

Here's to working towards a more just world.





Reopening Task Force - We're Getting Ready For You!

Our goals include:

- Improving the ventilation system in the sanctuary;
- Updating our security plan;
- Developing safety and security training;
- Increasing sanitizer availability.









The focus of this month's article is ventilation and COVID-19 prevention.

The Department of Health (DOH) found that good ventilation and air quality are important in reducing airborne exposure to COVID-19. The goal is to decrease the number of viral particles indoors by increasing the flow of outdoor air to the inside.

Temple Beth Or does not have an HVAC system — but not to worry. Following the guidelines from the DOH for buildings without HVAC systems, we have plans to strategically place window fans in the synagogue that will be on timers and will circulate outdoor/indoor air. This will significantly improve air quality.


