Our Diverse Experiences Help Create the Torah's Unity

Perhaps my greatest delight as your rabbi over these past few months has been witnessing members find their voice of Torah. I love afternoon meetings with our b'nei mitzvah students, supporting them as they craft their teachings that each will share as bar and bat mitzvah this summer. In addition to our emerging adults teaching Torah at Beth Or, I am in awe of the adult participants in our leadership development

series, Atidaynu:
Our Future, who
begin each session
by sharing their
teachings of Torah.

It did not take long for *Atidaynu* participants to discover the worth in looking at Torah through their own unique point of view as opposed to relying solely on our classical commentators. I remember an "aha" moment for the class at an early session when Amber Walbaum shared her words of Torah in the form of a Haiku. Before she recited her poem, Amber shared how her teaching came to fruition. Amber enlisted the help of

her eleven-year-old daughter, Maddy, who was learning about different forms of poetry in school. Amber's teaching revealed her unique face of Torah not only through the words that she shared but because she infused her experience as a mother with the ancient text of Torah. In the *Atidaynu* sessions that have followed, we have seen Torah infused with personal experiences, professional experiences,

family experiences, and artistic expressions too!

The participants have not only learned more about Temple Beth Or and the greater Jewish community by participating in *Atidaynu*, but each individual has explored



their authentic voice as a Jewish leader and teacher of Torah. The Shabbat service will infuse these adults' diverse voices of Torah throughout the service.

Resist Hate

The fight against hate and the rise of white nationalism is most effective when like-minded people and organizations join forces. That's why Temple Beth Or, along with the Snohomish County Executive and Sherriff's Offices, the City of Everett, the Communities of Color Coalition, the Faith Action Network, and the Anti-Defamation League, are hosting Eric Ward, human rights expert and Executive Director of Western States Center. Mr. Ward's presentation is titled, Resist Hate: Strengthening Our Response to the Rise of White Nationalism.

The event will be held Wednesday, May 15, at the PUD Auditorium, 2320 California St., Everett, at 7:00 pm (doors open at 6:30 pm).

Mr. Ward has nearly 30 years of expertise in community organizing and philanthropy. He will speak for about one hour then after a short break he will take questions from the audience. He is a national expert on the relationship between hate violence and preserving democratic institutions, governance, and inclusive societies.

Originally from Los Angeles, Mr. Ward began his civil rights work when the white nationalist movement was engaged in violent paramilitary activity that sought to undermine democratic governance in the Pacific Northwest.

Over the years he has worked with government leaders, civil rights campaigners, business leaders, and law enforcement officials to establish over 120 task forces in six states to expose and counter hate groups and respond to bigoted violence.

The *Tzedakah* Box recipient for April-June is the **Western States Center**, a non-profit organization whose mission is to connect and build the power of community organizations to achieve racial, gender, and economic justice. The Center is based in the Pacific Northwest and Mountain States but works nationwide to strengthen inclusive democracy so that all people can live, love, and work free from fear. They challenge the growth of white nationalism while strengthening communities' skills and determination to withstand the attack. Their vision is to achieve a just society where we all can flourish in sustainable, caring, and connected communities.
