Good News about Facilities!

Thanks to **Bob Goodmark** and **Koby Wexler** for meeting with our insurance company, Church Mutual. They have agreed to give us a one-year extension for accessing additional insurance funds resulting from the duplex fire to support a new construction project on site. This will give us adequate time to more fully consider the various aspects of facilities issue. **As a result of this change in our situation, the congregational membership meeting that was scheduled for August 8 has now been postponed to after the High Holy Days.** In the interim, we will be developing bylaws revisions to allow for "in person and/or virtual attendance using video conferencing platforms," along with other considerations.

Vaccination Status Request



After months of virtual gathering, we are finally able to begin to regather in person. As we look forward we are considering next steps in our regathering process and knowing the community vaccination rate will be useful in our planning. This information will be used for distributing service honors, joining the HHD choir, eligibility for shofar blowing, and parameters for our future events.

We are asking all members to please go to templebethor.org/vaccine-reporting and if you are comfortable, let us know your vaccination status. If you are not comfortable sharing this information, you may indicate that you do not wish to share your status. Vaccinated or not, everyone is welcome at our services.

We started to gather with our outdoor service in July and are moving to indoor services later this month. Currently masking and social distancing are required to keep us safe and allow all to come together. We hope that soon we will be able to gather safely with fewer restrictions. Knowing the vaccination rate could help make that possible. If you are comfortable participating in this voluntary effort, we appreciate your sharing this information to help move us forward.

From Our Rabbi

Blessings for Regathering

What is the best way to greet someone you have not seen since before the pandemic hit? Of course, the Talmud tackles this very question. Rabbinic Sage Yehoshua ben Levi said, "One who sees a friend for the first time after 30 days recites the Shehecheyanu blessing, "Blessed is the One who gives us life, sustains us and has allowed us to reach this moment." But after twelve months, one recites 'Blessed is the One who revives the dead (mechayei hameitim)" (Talmud Bavli, Berakhot 58b).

I do not know about you but I felt a bit like I had been revived from the dead when I first started seeing folks in person after more than a year in my family bubble. My social skills were rusty. Like many of you I have eased back to in-person life as Washington State restrictions eased, first regathering with close family and friends and then with members of our Beth Or family for pastoral visits and life-cycle events. I have found that with each in-person encounter I feel a bit more like myself and a bit less like an awkward zombie.

I would like to suggest that we do not follow the School of Yehoshua ben Levi and greet one another as if we have risen from the dead. I think a simple Jewish greeting is most appropriate for our regathering: "Shalom aleichem-peace be unto you." The grammar of this phrase is interesting. The word "aleichem—unto you" is in the second person plural instead of singular. Our mystical tradition teaches that the use of the plural is to remind us that when we come together with another individual, even if our opinions are different, we should approach that interaction with a goal of peace and unity.

I hope you will consider joining our first Shabbat service in our sanctuary on Friday, August 13, and mark the beginning of the High Holy Days with *Selichot* on Saturday evening, August 28. It is not just the prayers we offer during our worship services that create the sacred. Coming together for the sake of creating peace and unity among our beautifully diverse community is our sacred purpose.

From Our President

Flourishing as You Emerge From COVID-19 and Prepare to Start a New Year!



I recently heard an interview with Dr. Corey Keyes, professor of sociology at Emory University, in which he discussed the topics of languishing and flourishing. New studies show that many of us are stuck in an in-between place, not the same as depression, but just kind of blah. Experts call this languishing. Ideally, people should be flourishing. Particularly, during our time of COVID-19 precautions and isolation, people who previously had had good mental health were slipping into languishing.

Dr. Keyes discussed some key activities that help people to get beyond languishing into the realm of flourishing. He had six; I am adding one more that I truly believe in to make it a nice round seven. He suggested that you should try to do these every day. They are:

- Exercise
- Play
- Socialize
- Learn something new
- Engage in spiritual activity
- Help another person

 And my add on: Go outside – even if the weather isn't perfect (unless it is too smokey)

Thinking about these elements it occurred to me that participation at TBO could facilitate engaging in any of these activities. TBO members make excellent exercise buddies. I walk regularly with several of my TBO friends, as do many others. If you ever want to go for a walk with me let me know. Others hike, golf, or kayak together. There are also people in the community who play games together including Mah Jongg. To join the Mah Jongg group, reach out to Vicki Schwartz. Socializing, that one is easy! Any time we are together, even on Zoom, we have the opportunity to socialize.

Learning is a central part of our Jewish tradition and every service has a teaching. Plus we have other learning-related activities such as the DEI Equity Challenge (soon to restart), our ongoing book club, or our upcoming Elul High Holy Days (HHD) classes. offerings in your HHD information packet. Engage in spiritual activity – that is what synagogue is all about! Join us in prayer or reach out to the Rabbi for other spiritual resources. Join us as we come together for our first Friday night Shabbat in the sanctuary in over a year! **Friday, August 13** at 7:30 pm, Rabbi Kort and song leader, Noah Zeichner, will lead this Shabbat. In keeping with our currently approved procedures, advance registration, sent by email, **is required by 3:00 pm Friday, August 13** to facilitate chair set up and contact tracing. Attendance is limited to 55 people and registration opens on Tuesday, August 10. Those with *yahrzeits* will be able to pre-register starting on Friday, August 7. Registration will be on a first come, first served basis. If registration is full when you try to register please contact the office so that you can be given priority at the next service and/or be placed on a waiting list. When you register you need to list all the names of your family group. If two households are attending together, please register as one family group. If you are unable to register online, please contact the office. Masks and social distancing, along with responding to self-attestation questions, will be required for entry to the building. Please arrive early to ensure we get everyone settled in time for services to begin promptly. These services will also be live streamed over Zoom. 

Advocacy

Here is information and a suggestion from a congregant who is also a concerned citizen. A big part of our civic responsibility toward democracy is communicating with elected representatives about how we feel they should vote. One current debate is over the filibuster in the Senate, which essentially makes it impossible to pass legislation without 60 votes. Passing legislation is rarely happening with the Senate split 50/50. Many folks say the only way to get legislation to advance is to end the filibuster, which is not in the Constitution. It was designed to placate slave states to get them to join the Union in the early days of our country. The website, Talking Points Memo, just published a list of where different senators stand on eliminating the filibuster. Our two fine Senators, Patty Murray and Maria Cantwell, both favor reforming the filibuster, but NOT eliminating it. Do you agree? Please contact the Senators and tell them how you feel on this issue. Patty Murray's website is https://www.murray.senate.gov/public/index.cfm?p=ContactMe and Maria Cantwell's website is https://www.cantwell.senate.gov/contact/ where you can leave an email message. As long as the filibuster remains the government is deadlocked, which is the point of it. But we need progress! Contact your Senators today.

The Social Action Committee also urges everyone who is concerned about the state of our democracy to educate themselves about gerrymandering and the impact this has on fair representation. Look at the website: allontheline.org for clear information.

Leadership

What Happened at the June Board Meeting?

- 1. The Board discussed the upcoming greeter needs as we move to a hybrid of inperson and streamed activities. The idea of a greeter committee, not just board members, was suggested. This should be explored further.
- 2. The Board reviewed the calendar of summer meetings and decided to cancel the August Board meeting, unless a crisis comes up between now and then. Many would be unavailable and reaching a quorum might be difficult. Given the timing of the HHD, we will likely have an August/September meeting in late August.
- 3. **Jennifer Cail** updated the Board on the plans for RS and youth programming for the fall.
- 4. **Bob Goodmark** shared information about the Feasibility Study related to the viability of a capital campaign needed to finance our potential remodel.
- 5. The Board was introduced to the Safety and Security Committee by Miriam **VonAschen-Cook** and trained on how to use the new Incident Report Form. Greeter training was June 27 in person at TBO at 10:00am. All who attended were fully vaccinated. Those who could not participate that day can join in a similar training planned for the fall for the RS staff.
- 6. There was a presentation about the need for a Child Safety Policy. **Iulie Mackoff** and **Tina Roth** will be spearheading this effort.
- 7. JonaRose Feinberg, chair of the Communications Committee, summarized the results of the Congregational Communication Survey. We also discussed the ORacle and the options of going digital and/or in color including use of opting in or opting out to reduce mailing unwanted copies. The Communications Committee will prepare a recommendation for the Board on this topic.
- 8. A discussion about the upcoming August bar mitzvah resulted in approving a motion adopting the protocol requested by the family.
- 9. Discussion of the June Membership Meeting logistics, the May financials and the President's report were moved to future email or other discussions.
- 10. Tim Douglass resigned from the Board. His last participation was at the June 13 Membership Meeting. He was thanked for his service. Note: Wanda Bresnick has since been appointed to fill Tim's position as Vice President of Community and Engagement.
