Sharing the Light of Hanukkah

My daughter, Galit, has been asking for weeks if Candy Cane Lane will be open this vear. It's a cul de sac in the north end of Seattle that goes all out with Christmas decorations. It has been a Kort family tradition for more than 30 years to drive around the small block, usually multiple times, enjoying the decorations and listening to our favorite Hanukkah music. While we aren't a "Christmas" family, we sure do enjoy our neighbors' holiday displays during the darkest, longest days of winter.

It's not a coincidence that many cultures celebrate holidays that include festive lights around winter solstice. While some years, holidays coincide to create a kaleidoscope of light, this year Diwali, Hanukkah, Christmas, and Kwanzaa are nicely spaced apart. The more opportunities to enjoy light, the merrier, in my opinion.

Our Jewish tradition

encourages us to share our unique light of Hanukkah. Our Sages in the Talmud invite us to publicize the miracle of the oil by lighting our Hanukkah menorahs in a place for the public to enjoy. In Israel, many lighting time each night of folks light their chanukkiyot outside of their homes, placing them in glass or plexiglass boxes to keep the wind from blowing out the flames (see below). It is magical to walk around religious neighborhoods there and enjoy the warm glow from wicks burning in olive oil. Broad living room windowsills could use a bit of extra light make a nice public place for us to light our candles publicly while still warm in our homes.

If you are uncomfortable displaying a *chanukiyah* in public or if you are looking for new opportunities to share Hanukkah light, Zoom technology offers alternatives. While my family is disappointed that we cannot spend Hanukkah physically with grandparents who live

around the country and just up the street, we have



planned a designated candle Hanukkah so we can all enjoy the gift of family and regular connection for eight days. Our Small Group Task Force wants to invite you to find a night of Hanukkah to light candles and enjoy conversation with your Small Group. In addition, think about people in your life, Jewish and non-Jewish, who and levity during these dark times. Invite them to share candle lighting with you over Zoom or another platform. This is not the right year for large in-person Hanukkah and holiday celebrations, but it is the most important time for us to share our special Hanukkah light.

- 3. Everyone except those directly involved in running the meeting will be muted in order to control extraneous sounds. We have two very capable Board members who will be monitoring chat and you are encouraged to use the Zoom chat feature for questions and comments.
- 4. Voting will be the same as we used for approving our budget in June and will be explained in ORbits and at the meeting.
- 5. Make sure the names of all voting participants are in your Zoom window so all votes can be counted (right click on the name in the left corner of your picture; click to rename).
- 6. Reminder: This meeting is for members only. Please do not share the link.

While there have been challenges, it has been an honor to serve. Wishing all a happy, healthy 2021. May we all be able to be together again next year!



Gentle reminder: The Temple is closed. Books may not be picked up without these prior arrangements.




