A Message from the TBO President: Updated COVID-19 Protocols

The Combined COVID-19 Task Force (TF) has met to revisit the TBO COVID-19 protocols and the Governing Board (GB) has voted to approve the updated recommendations. The revised recommendations outline how our congregation can safely gather now that statewide mask mandates have been lifted and health official guidelines have reduced restrictions as a result of decreased case numbers, rates of hospitalization, and deaths. Required precautions will be tied to Snohomish County case rate figures (average new cases per day per 100,000 population, calculated based on published weekly figures). If this value is at or below 25, these updated protocols will be in effect. If the value exceeds 25 new cases per day per 100,000 population or other considerations warrant it, more protective measures may be necessary. The recommendations are summarized below. The full text of the recommendations can be found on the TBO website templebethor.org/covid/.

General:

- Protocols will be re-assessed and reviewed frequently and may change as warranted as conditions change.
- Anyone not feeling well or experiencing symptoms should not attend in-person services, activities or events. •
- TBO will continue to encourage and support vaccination and booster shots for all who are eligible.
- The metric that we will be using to determine the mode of operation is the Snohomish County Health District new cases per day per 100,000 population. If this value is at or below 25, these updated protocols will be in effect. If the value exceeds 25 new cases per day per 100,000 population or other considerations warrant it, more protective measures may be necessary. This case information is available at /www.snohd.org/546/Local-Case-Counts.
- Religious School (RS) will continue to follow the protocols that have been in place (including masking, symptom • checks, distancing, and notifications) through the end of the school year. Others at the Temple during RS will also be required to follow the RS protocols, including refraining from eating and drinking at the Temple.
- In addition to in-person services, we will continue to offer services and congregational meetings virtually whenever possible.


For All:

- Masking will be optional during non-RS hours. Making this choice will be an individual decision and either way will be respected.
- Sign in and out will be required for safety and security reasons, as well as contact tracing.
- Appointments are no longer required for using the building. During office hours advanced notification of building access is requested for safety and security reasons. Please contact the office prior to entering the building.
- Social distancing will not be enforced, limits on numbers of attendees at services will not be restricted due to ٠ COVID-19. (Fire code restrictions and other appropriate number limits will still apply.)
- Kiddush and oneg will be allowed at services.

For Members:

- Pre-registration will not be required to attend services.
- All attendees will need to be fully vaccinated and boosted or fully vaccinated and have a negative COVID-19 test. (See full recommendation for specifics.). Please update your status at: tinyurl.com/vaccinereporting.

For Non-Members:

- Pre-registration will still be required.
- Proof of vaccination and booster will be required in advance.

Off Site Activities:

- Protocols will be set by the event coordinator in accordance with current guidelines.
- Protocols will be clearly communicated to participants so they can make informed decisions about attending.

I would like to extend gratitude to members of both the TF and the GB for their thoughtful and thorough consideration of this issue. I would also like to thank all of you in the congregation for your continued patience and understanding as we navigate this virus with the best of intentions to keep our community safe and connected. Lag BaOmer: Emerging from Isolation to Community

Lag BaOmer is a minor holiday celebrated with major fun. Bonfires and barbeques are the tradition in Israel and at TBO this year too. While I know our community will enjoy s'mores together at the beach, we can glean deep wisdom from the holiday too. Lag BaOmer is said to be the *yahrzeit* of the second century sage Rabbi Shimon bar Yochai who found safety from the Romans by hiding in a cave. The Talmud (*Bavli, Shabbat* 33b) tells the tale of his rough re-entry into society after more than a decade of isolation.

After the destruction of the Second Temple, Jews in the Land of Israel responded to this trauma in different ways. Some refused defeat (the story of Masada) while others conceded to life under Roman rule and adapted Jewish practices to center on prayer and learning instead of sacrifices at our central Temple. Transitioning away from trauma and an established way of life is difficult.

Shimon bar Yochai would not hold his tongue from speaking out against Roman rule and fled for safety with his colleague, Eleazar. They barricaded themselves in a cave where, miraculously, a carob tree and a spring appeared and sustained them through twelve years of total isolation. None other than Elijah the Prophet came to tell Shimon and Eleazar that the emperor was dead and they could emerge back into the world but their re-entry into society went terribly wrong. They saw a Jewish man ploughing a field, going on with his life as though the Temple had never been destroyed! This enraged Shimon and Eleazar. They looked at this farmer with a gaze so fierce that the farmer was immediately burnt up! This prompted the Divine Voice of God to call out "go back into your cave!" They stayed in the cave for another year. When they emerged for the second time, they saw a person preparing for Shabbat with a practice that was unfamiliar to them. This time, instead of responding with rage, they recognized the practice as beautiful and offered praise.

Like Shimon bar Yochai and Eleazar, our first response to the trauma and isolation of these past two years might be anger. Outbursts of rage seem to be all around us: on airplanes, at award shows, and maybe even at work. Many of us are just starting to enjoy in-person community again. Things will feel different because our world has changed and we as individuals have changed. Let's glean wisdom from Shimon bar Yochai and Eleazar by taking time and energy to process the big feelings that come with our transitions from isolation to community in order to embrace and enjoy the beauty in the world around us.

TBO joins Interfaith Call to Expedite Refugee Efforts for Ukrainians

Temple Beth Or joined over 375 Jewish and other faith-based groups and organizations from around the U.S. co-signing a letter urging President Biden to take immediate steps to welcome refugees from Ukraine and reunite families. The effort was coordinated by the Jewish Federations of North America.

"The Jewish community and our faith partners across the United States urge you take immediate steps to help Ukrainian civilians, including by expediting the resettlement of Ukrainians who are already in process to come to the United States thanks to their close family ties here," the letter states.

- How do we inspire people to take action against poverty?

LIFE & LEGACY Committee

Did you know that philanthropic consultants recommend that in order to remain financially healthy 20% of a non-profit's operating budget come from income generated by an endowment? In 2016 TBO had about \$21,000 in endowment funds and no income from them. The Governing Board then constituted TBO's Legacy Committee to help oversee our endowments. To build our endowment, we joined the LIFE & LEGACY program, a national program founded to help build



endowments in Jewish communities. Since then, 59 Temple members have made a bequest to TBO. Thanks to all of you who have made a commitment to the LIFE & LEGACY program in support of TBO's future. In recognition of your participation and the Legacy Committee's work these past six years, the Foundation sponsoring LIFE & LEGACY has given TBO \$26,500 in incentive grants, including \$2,000 last month. Yet, we have much work yet to do. The endowment program is still in its infancy.

Update on the Remodel Project/Capital Campaign

Since our last issue a lot of work has been done to move us forward on this project. The congregation has had two opportunities to engage in this effort in April - a Town Hall Meeting and on site/in-person remodel building tours. We have also shared the Next Steps Review prepared by our consultant, Rachel Maxwell. Just to review, here's a summary of the pathway for this project and where we currently are in the process. Keep in mind, future dates are estimates as schedules can shift due to unforeseen circumstances.

Preparation - What do we want to do?

2021 - The congregation conducted a robust decision-making process, culminating in a vote to approve remaining in our current location and pursue remodeling our facilities.

Phase 1 - Next Steps Review

January 2022 - Our consultant, Rachel Maxwell, began the Next Steps Review, to assess our readiness for embarking on a Capital Campaign.

March 2022 - The Next Steps Review was completed. Results were shared with the congregation and can be found at: <u>templebethor.org/facilities-planning/</u>. We are ready to begin Phase 2!

Phase 2 - Financial Feasibility Assessment (We are here now!)

April 2022 - The Capital Campaign Task Force and Rachel Maxwell began the Financial Feasibility Assessment. Invitations to participate in interviews have been sent to a representative cross-section of the congregation.

May 2022 - Financial Feasibility Assessment interviews will be conducted.

June 2022 - Results of the Financial Feasibility Assessment will be shared with the congregation at our Membership Meeting (June 12). The congregation will have the opportunity to vote to support moving onto the Capital Campaign.

Phase 3 - The Capital Campaign

Summer 2022 - Begin the Leadership/Quiet portion of the Capital Campaign.

Fall 2022 - Launch the full Capital Campaign, finalize the design, and contract with the architect.

Winter 2022/2023 - Complete the Capital Campaign.

Phase 4 - Preparing to Remodel the Building

2023 - Congregational vote to commit to the remodel, authorizing funds to proceed.

2023 - Working with architect to finalize plans, obtain permits, etc.

Financial Feasibility Assessment Information

What's a Financial Feasibility Assessment (FFA) and how does it work? The FFA is a process conducted by our consultant, Rachel Maxwell, to help us get a sense of how much money we might be able to raise during our Capital Campaign. Knowing this information will help us decide how extensive a remodel is within our reach and will guide the development of final plans for the remodel project.

Rachel will conduct private confidential interviews with 25 TBO households during the month of May. These households were selected somewhat randomly but also specifically chosen to represent the full range of the demographics of our membership including founding, long term, newer, older, and younger members, those with children of varying ages, retired, those who live close, and those who live farther, etc. The full range of economic situations is also covered by this sampling. The identified interview candidates were sent invitations to participate in April. If you were invited to participate, please respond promptly and schedule your interview time slot. Whether or not you are a participant in this part of the process, not to worry, you will absolutely be invited to join in the full Capital Campaign!

After the interviews are completed Rachel will review and process the data collected. This information will be shared with the congregation at the June 12 Membership Meeting. If you have questions about this process contact Norm Black for more information.

4. Reviewed the logistics for the April 20 congregational meeting.

5. Were introduced to the Life and Legacy Committee and heard a full presentation on their program from Harold Dash. Discussed our role.

6. Was introduced to the Finance Committee by James Feinberg.

7. Examined the draft budget shared by Tom Elsemore and James Feinberg.

8. Considered the latest recommendation from the Combined COVID-19 Task Force. The Board approved the recommendations. (See page 1.)

9. Talked about the possible *oneg* on April 23.

10. Heard a quick update on the Capital Campaign and plans for April 20 & 23 congregational opportunities.

11. Heard an update from James Feinberg about the South Lot rental property.

12. Reviewed the February financial reports.

13. Heard highlights of the President's Report including: RH Coordinator recruited (Robyn Klarman), potential relaunching of the donor dinner, participation in the Seattle Jewish Community Ukraine Challenge, and reminder about upcoming calendaring meeting.
