The Spiritual Language of Music

Music is my spiritual language - many of you know that before I wanted to be a rabbi, I thought I wanted to be a classical musician. I loved playing the oboe in the Seattle Youth Symphony, but as I spent hours alone in a claustrophobic practice room preparing for college auditions, I realized that most of your time as a classical musician is spent by yourself, practicing scales. Even at seventeen, I knew I needed my profession to be more connected with people.

What I loved most about playing the oboe was the collective creative process of playing in a full symphony orchestra. Playing my small part to create a majestic Brahms symphony. Bringing to life and adding new nuance to music

composed hundreds of years ago. Although not inherently Jewish, playing in a symphony orchestra is one of my most spiritual experiences.

When I was in rabbinic school in New York I met a Jewish musician who spoke the same spiritual language of music that I did. Joey Weisenberg was a friend of a friend who wasn't studying to be a cantor, but rather studying Jewish music anthropology. He believed that the collective creation of music and the timeless nature of music are key components of the spiritual power of music. Whether in a Jewish context or a secular setting, music in and of itself is a spiritual tool. In addition to graduate school Joey was the song leader for services at a small, sleepy synagogue in Cobble Hill, Brooklyn. Participating in Joey's services gave me amazing clarity on how I experience the Divine through connecting with others.

In the twenty years since I met Joey Weisenberg he has shared his spiritual and musical gifts with thousands as the founder and co-director of the Hadar Rising Song Institute, whose mission is to cultivate the grassroots musical/spiritual creativity of the Jewish people. Rising Song workshops explore the spiritual underpinnings of song and study the complex intersection between individual and communal voice. They explore diverse voices within the global Jewish musical heritage.

The Hadar Rising Song Institute is coming to Seattle and I want to invite you to enjoy their music with me. Co-Directors of Hadar Rising Song, Joey Weisenberg and Rabbi Deborah Sacks Mintz, along with their friend and local Jewish musician, Chava Mirel, are sharing a concert at Congregation Beth Shalom in the North End of Seattle on Selichot evening, Saturday, September 17.

Dan and I would like to invite our Temple Beth Or family to our house for dinner before the concert. (We're just a mile and a half to Beth Shalom). Come over as early as 6:30 pm. It's a tradition for Selichot services to take place late at night. Our concert will begin at 9 pm.

He has loved learning Hebrew as part of his bar mitzvah preparations, and especially loves celebrating Shabbat and Hanukkah.

On his Tikkun Olam Project: Big Ask, Big Project, Big Mitzvah!

Did you know that our Everett Police Department's K-9 officers don't have bulletproof vests? They only have a fabric police harness and a leash. They are in grave danger from armed criminals! They risk their lives *every day for citizens of Snohomish County*.

This fall, I met an Everett Police officer and his K-9 partner, Duke. The human officer told me that Duke and his three fellow K-9 officers get shot at and some bad guys also try to stab them! This happens all the time and even though the K-9 officers are in danger, they risk their lives to keep us safe anyway.

I feel so strongly about trying to do something to help protect our K-9 officers that I am making this my bar mitzvah project. I can't do this on my own and I need your help.

My goal is to raise enough money for at least two bulletproof vests for these real-life K-9 superheroes by my bar mitzvah on August 13, 2022. Each vest costs \$1200. These bulletproof or ballistic canine vests can stop a severe or even fatal knife or bullet injury from occurring. I hope that after the fundraising is over all four K-9 officers are safe from knives and bullets fired by the criminals they're trying to catch.

- The Community Giving Fund distributes donations bi-annually. Rabbi Kort determines which charitable
 organization(s) will be the recipient(s) of the fund for the first half of the fiscal year. The Social Action
 Committee, with the concurrence of the Rabbi, designates recipients for the second half of the fiscal
 year.

Tishah B'Av: Reflecting on Contemporary Loss

Location: a waterfront park in Lynnwood/Edmonds (in-person only)

Tishah B'Av is our Jewish day of historical mourning where we mark the destruction of both ancient Temples in Jerusalem. We as a Jewish people understand that we can grieve structures, institutions, and ways of life, in addition to the loss of loved ones.

For most liberal Jews, Tishah B'Av has faded in importance as a ritual observance, as the rebuilding of a central Temple in Jerusalem has lost its priority and significance in modern times. This year, we'll take the opportunity of Tishah B'Av to help us process some of the losses we have experienced over the past two years due to COVID-19 - sacred time with friends and family, jobs, vacations, etc.

Together we will look at traditional Jewish texts and contemporary sources on loss and grief and join together in a ritual to mark our losses and move toward healing.

COVID-19 Update



The Combined COVID-19 Task Force met July 7 and has approved to switch the metrics used to determine if we are eligible to forgo masking and have *onegs*. We will now be using the updated guidelines used by the CDC and recently adopted by the Snohomish Health District. Local data is shared weekly on Mondays on the Snohomish Health District website. The latest guidelines from the CDC use a metric of 200 new cases/100,000 population per week and hospitalization rates.

With the expanded eligibility of vaccines and boosters, members ages 5 and up will need to be vaccinated and boosted and those 6 months to 5 years will need to begin their vaccination series by the High Holy Days.
