High Holy Days 2023/5784

The High Holy Days will soon be here and we have been hard at work preparing. Information regarding registration and programming will be going out the first week of August. For a preview, please see page 8.

Our High Holy Day programming will include:

- A return to our annual Rosh HaShanah Festival with some new afternoon activity options, including apple cider tasting and a community art project.
- A special late afternoon Kol Nidrei service just for families with kids including the Kol Nidrei melody played by violinist and TBO member Meghan Lefrancois-Hanson.
- Cellist Rebekah Hood-Sava from the Pacifica Chamber Orchestra will return this year to play *Kol Nidrei*.
- Rabbi Kort and Steven Chaitman will offer new, creative, spiritual space on Yom Kippur afternoon, infusing a traditional chanting and translation of the Book of Jonah with contemporary music, art, and an optional hands-on project.
- Sermons from **Rabbi Kort** exploring: The Need to Be Seen; AI: The New Golem; and The Blessing of a Blank Canvas: Creativity and Repentance.





The Pursuit of a Just Judicial System in Israel

As Israel marks its 75th anniversary, the largest protest movement in the country's history has been raging since March. Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu and his coalition that includes ultranationalists and ultra-Orthodox allies have proposed a series of bills that would limit the Supreme Court's oversight powers and push Israel towards a more authoritarian rule. These legislative proposals have inspired hundreds of thousands of Israelis to hit the streets and protest for democracy. As I write this article in mid-July, protesters recently responded to the passing of a contentious bill with a *Day of Disruption* that shut down major roads and transportation hubs, including Ben Gurion International Airport.

While many view the current divide in Israeli society along religious and secular lines, the pro-democracy movement in Israel is embracing a core Jewish value that our judicial system must be fair. In this month of August, we read in the Book of Deuteronomy the iconic words: Justice, justice you shall pursue — tzedek, tzedek tirdof (16:20). The Torah places this charge to pursue justice in the context of leadership and settling and thriving in the Land of Israel.

You shall appoint magistrates and public officials for your tribes, in all the settlements that Adonai your God is giving to you, and they shall govern the people with due justice. You shall not judge unfairly, you shall show no partiality, you shall not take bribes — for bribes blind the eye of the discerning and upset the plea of the just. Justice, justice you shall pursue — tzedek, tzedek tirdof — that you may thrive and occupy the land that Adonai your God is giving you. (16:18-20).

Nachmanides, the famous 13th century Torah commentator, taught "the reason for the repetition [of the word 'justice'] is to indicate that the judges should judge the people with righteous judgment, and you must also pursue justice constantly."

The Torah teaches that ordinary citizens must pursue every avenue to ensure that public affairs are run on a basis of righteousness. The pro-democracy movement in Israel is living these words of Torah as they fight for a righteous and fair judicial system in the State of Israel.

There are ways for us to pursue justice and democracy in Israel while living thousands of miles away:

- Advocate Write to the Consul General of Israel to the Pacific Northwest, Marco Sermoneta (456 Montgomery St., #2100, San Francisco, CA 94104) and let him know you oppose Prime Minister Benjamin Netenyahu's judicial overhaul.
- **Give Tzedakah** Support a Jewish and democratic State of Israel by helping fund the work of the Israeli Religious Action Center.
- "Pray with Your Feet" Join a local (Bellevue) protest organized by UnXeptable, a grassroots movement launched by Israel expats in support of a democratic Israel (seattle@unxeptable.org).

National Antisemitism Strategy Released

On May 25, 2023, the Biden-Harris administration released the first U.S. National Strategy to counter antisemitism. This strategy was prepared by the Interagency Policy Committee on Antisemitism, Islamophobia, and Related Forms of Bias and Discrimination, which is led by the White House Domestic Policy Council and the National Security Council. The strategy outlines over 100 new actions that Executive branch agencies have committed to take in order to counter antisemitism.

Volunteering

Several TBO members have been volunteering with Refugee and Immigrant Services Northwest (RISNW) to welcome refugees from Ukraine. There are several other faith groups involved in this effort, so not as many volunteers from TBO are needed every week.

However, we do have an opportunity to assist RISNW with a 6 week summer reading program for refugee children ages 5-11. We need more volunteers to help the children with craft projects and snack time, which are part of the program. It is held at Everett Community College on Wednesdays from 10:00 am - Noon, July 19 - August 23. Please let **Vicki Schwartz** know if you are interested in working with RISNW.

Volunteering your time is another form of giving *tzedakah*. The Social Action Committee would love to hear about where people donate their time and efforts in our community. Please contact **Naomi Katsh Barger** if you want to share your volunteer story.

Policy Updates

Given that the "emergency phase" of the COVID-19 pandemic is behind us, the TBO Governing Board has revisited a number of policies and procedures over the last several months. All COVID-19 related restrictions have been lifted. Two updated items remain as described below.

- 1. *Masking* While masking is no longer required at TBO, in keeping with our value of inclusion, a masked area has been designated in the sanctuary. Out of consideration for those who are more comfortable sitting among those who are also masked, a limited section on the north side of the sanctuary (left as you face the bimah) is now reserved for masked individuals. Those who choose to mask may sit anywhere they would like but those who sit in this area should be masked. Designated seats are indicated with labels placed on the chairs by the greeters before services. Masks are available in the lobby for those who would like one. This procedure will be revisited periodically as needed. Questions about this practice can be directed to President Wanda Bresnick.
- 2. Guest Registration While guest pre-registration to collect vaccine information is no longer warranted, our Safety and Security Committee has recommended the continuation of guest registration as a security measure. Given the rise in antisemitic activities, it is a recommended precaution. The updated guest policy has been approved by the Board. If you are inviting a nonmember to a TBO event, be sure to have them complete the guest registration form available online templebethor.org/service-registration. In addition to the safety benefits, this registration also facilitates outreach by our Membership Committee to potential new members. The full policy can be found at: tinyurl.com/tboguest. Update on the TBO Remodel Project

The people involved in the remodel project are quite busy with work happening on several parallel tracks.

Many comments received at the June Membership Meeting and in subsequent conversations have been incorporated into an updated version of the plan. The Remodel Task Force is committed to soliciting and considering additional input and comments from the community. Watch for a congregational email introducing a new password protected remodel page on our website. We will share updated information, including a video of a narrated walk-though of the most recent building plans and process, and will provide a question and answer/comment forum which can be used to share your input and suggestions about these plans. You can also email any thoughts or ideas directly to **Harold Dash**, **Melanie Field** and/or **Glen Pickus**. At this time we are soliciting input focused on the building floor plan. Comments should be submitted by August 31, in order for suggestions to potentially to be factored into the plans.

Members of the Remodel Task Force are continuing to coordinate with the architect and the City of Everett Planning Department in an effort to obtain our Conditional Use Permit (CUP). Recently we negotiated the number of required parking spaces to align with our available space.

A sub-group is focused on the contractor selection process. Led by **Eldon Wexler**, this team has created a list of contractors to consider, developed interview questions and assessment criteria, and have scheduled interviews for late July. Contractor recommendations will be shared with the full Remodel Task Force in August. Following preparation of construction drawings, bids will be requested.

An interior/exterior design sub-group has also been formed and is preparing to work on the interior and exterior elements. Watch for more information from this group in the fall.

Meanwhile, the Capital Campaign group is still focused on raising the funds to make all of this possible. Once an updated cost estimate (or cost range) for the total construction costs is available, the Capital Campaign will begin a final fundraising push to close the gap between what we have raised (currently over \$1.9 million) and what it will cost to complete the project.

Phishing - Scammers Target TBO

Beware of electronic tricksters, TBO has been phished. Phishing is like fishing, even pronounced the same. A big fish (or bad person) tries to catch a smaller fish (you) to eat it (or steal your personal or TBO's information) by tempting you with something yummy or, in the case of humans, information that you will "bite" on. It could be an email from **Rabbi Kort** asking for help or a TBO

member asking for a hard copy of the directory. Both of those things happened in July.

So a word to the wise: don't bite on the bait! If an email or text looks fishy, don't respond or contact the person/company directly using an email or phone number you know to be correct. If it is coming from someone claiming to be from TBO, call the Temple office before responding. If it is a phishing or smishing (via text) scam, we will log it and report it to Everett PD and the Secure Community Network at the Jewish Federation. Remember that TBO will never text or email asking you for money. Yes, these bad actors are great at what they do, so don't feel stupid if you fall for it, but DO err on the side of caution and let the office know.

Oneg and Community Greeting Responsibilities

One of the joys of being fully back in our building is our ability to have *onegs* after services. *Oneg* literally means "pleasure or delight," and it is indeed a delight to nosh and visit with each other after services. Providing *oneg* for our community is both a mitzvah and a responsibility of membership. **Janet Karr**, our *Oneg* Coordinator, has created a schedule to provide each family in our community the opportunity to work with two other families to offer an *oneg* after a service. If you are unable to meet your *oneg* responsibility for the assigned week, please trade with another family so that each week is covered.

Since it has been some time since many of us have worked to provide an *oneg*, let's review the expectations:

- Earlier in the week, you will receive an email listing the complete *oneg* responsibilities. The list is also posted in the kitchen. Please be sure to read the list carefully.
- Coordinate food with the two other families assigned for your week.
- Arrive about 30 minutes early to set up the room and get food laid out before the start of service.
- You are also responsible for cleanup after the *oneg*. The Board greeter will lock the building when you are done with cleanup.

Another member responsibility and opportunity to connect with our members is to serve as a community greeter, which **Janet Karr** will also assign. Information on community greeting will be sent to you the week of your service.

The responsibilities of greeting include:

- Arrive 30 minutes before the start of the service.
- The Board greeter will assign you a position (either the upstairs or downstairs entrance). Welcome people as they enter. If you are at the upstairs door, please hand them a prayer book and bulletin.
- Be sure to stay at your assigned door. The door should never be propped open or left unattended.

Signing up in advance allows you to get the date that works best for you, take a moment to sign up for both oneg and community greeter at templebethor.org/oneg.

Providing *oneg* and being a community greeter are wonderful ways to observe a *yahrzeit* and connect with our community. Thank you for taking your turn to provide this mitzvah!

Leadership News

During the Governing Board Meetings in June and July, the Board did the following:

June 4, 2023:

- 1. Approved the minutes from the May 8, 2023, Governing Board Meeting.
- 2. Reviewed the plan for the Semi-Annual Membership Meeting (6/11) and discussed upcoming events Donor Dinner (7/22) and BBQ (8/27).
- 3. **Melanie Field** provided an update about the remodel process, including that the recent increases in fundraising allow us to now focus on the four classroom design option. The Board agreed that there was no need to present the two classroom option at the Membership Meeting. All agreed that it would be a good idea to share the language of what had been approved by the congregational vote last year.
- 4. **Melanie Field** presented a draft of a Dietary Policy that had been created with input from **Rabbi Kort**. It was agreed that it would be discussed further at the next Board Meeting.
- 5. **Melanie Field** presented a draft of a Nonmember Guest Policy. The Policy was approved (please see article on page 6).
- 6. **Norm Black** presented general information about TBO finances, our budget and accounting system, and membership demographics. He explained the elements of the monthly finance report and reviewed the previous month's report.
- 7. **Melanie Field** shared information about an unexpected legacy donation. President **Wanda Bresnick** has now officially been designated as the executor of the will and will answer questions at the Membership Meeting.
- 8. Committee Reports highlights: need for a new chair/co-chair of the Social Action Committee to take over for **Naomi Katsh Barger** and a new *ORbits* Coordinator to take over for **Lori Wolff**.

July 12, 2023:

- Due to a lack of quorum we were unable to approve the June Board minutes or any updated policies. These items were moved to the August Board meeting.
- 2. Reviewed the High Holy Days schedule and obtained Board input and questions to pass on to those planning the HHDs.
- 3. Reviewed the Finance and Committee Reports.
- 4. Discussed the Food Policy. **Melanie Field** and **Julie Mackoff** will be working to revise this.
- 5. **Julie Mackoff** will be working on a Code of Ethics. She received input from the Board on what values to include. This project comes at the request of the URJ for all congregations to review/update/create a policy.
