Kvell More, Kvetch Less



I have a book on my coffee table with a picture of a sourpuss little boy with the title *Born to Kvetch: Yiddish Language and Culture in All of Its Moods*. Kvetch is the Yiddish word used for complaining and, well, our Jewish people have been kvetching since the time we left Egypt. Over the summer, as we make our way through the fourth book of the Torah, *Bamidbar*, we will recount episode after episode of the Israelite people whining to God and Moses. They complain that there is no water. They want meat and fish, not just manna to eat. They think Moses is doing a lousy job as a leader. They complain that it will be too difficult to conquer the giants inhabiting the Promised Land. This generation of Israelites kvetches so much that they are not able to move forward as a people into the Promised Land.

I learned from the book, *Born to Kvetch*, that while we use the word kvetch to describe whining and complaining, it literally means to squeeze. I've learned over my 13 years serving as a congregational rabbi that too much kvetching can strangle the energy out of the folks who work hard to support and lead Jewish communities. But there is an antidote to kvetching: kvelling. To kvell is the Yiddish word meaning 'to praise.'

My colleague, Rabbi Paul Kipnes, who serves Congregation Or Ami in Calabasas, California, sends out a public service announcement to his congregation at the end of Yom Kippur:

Please wait three days before passing on the kvetches [to the Or Ami professional team]. Problems with the air conditioning or the sound system, disagreement with the rabbi's topic, or preference for a different musical selection, need not be the primary communication to a group of people who worked for months to make your annual trek into synagogue holiness. If, after three days, the kvetches still seem to be important and relevant, then send them along, but only if you first sent along a message of kvelling, and then only if sandwiched between a bunch of praises, and only with the compassion worthy of a newly minted sin–free Jew.

Congregation Or Ami, a medium-large-sized congregation, is structured in a different way than Temple Beth Or, which at 125 families strong, is considered a small-sized congregation. Programming and facilities at Or Ami is all professionally led by three full-time clergy, a full-time executive director, and even more staff. All that we offer at Temple Beth Or, from High Holy Days to education to *oneg*, is driven by our volunteer leaders with the support of your part-time professional team.

I do not think I would have the chutzpah (that's Yiddish for audacity) to email you the same message after the High Holy Days. In the space of this *ORacle* article, I would like to ask you to remember the importance of kvelling more than kvetching to help nourish our incredible volunteer members. As your sacred partner and rabbi, I am in awe of the energy and care you put into creating Jewish life and community in Snohomish County.

While our ancestors might be kvetching in the Torah this summer season, as we spend time together this summer for Shabbat and community gatherings, working towards the remodel, preparing for High Holy Days, and getting ready for Religious School and BOTY in the fall, let's remember to kvell way more than we kvetch. And when you do kvetch, please do so with compassion and kvell a little too.

Belonging

In April, I attended the Scheidt Seminar for temple presidents in Dallas. I came back inspired with some great ideas, new perspectives, and good connections with other presidents from small congregations. After hearing stories from others, I also felt such appreciation and gratitude for the beautiful sacred partnerships I have with **Rabbi Kort** and the Governing Board. I feel truly blessed by our community. A couple of people from the URJ told me Temple Beth Or is known as the "small but mighty" congregation.

This year's theme at Scheidt was belonging. We looked at many aspects of what it means to belong, including the difference between welcoming and belonging. Belonging is the feeling of security and support when there is a sense of acceptance, inclusion, and identity with a certain group. Four elements go into belonging: I am noticed (when I am

not here), I am named, I am known (some detail about me), and I am needed (have something to contribute).

Belonging is a fundamental human need that is hardwired into our DNA. We all need a place to belong.

At our May Governing Board meeting, our sharing question was to talk about a time that we each felt we belonged in our Temple Beth Or community. The Board had a variety of responses, including:

- A sense of belonging through the support and love they received during life cycle events such as their child's baby naming or b'nei mitzvah. They had a sense of being one big family.
- How overwhelmed she felt after the passing of her husband by the loving support from our community, including people she didn't yet know.
- A sense of belonging they felt on Rosh Hashanah at Camp Kalsman when we came together in that beautiful, spiritual setting.
- A sense of belonging at the Women's Seder where we took time to honor the women in our past.
- At the recent Lag B'Omer Celebration a sense of belonging was felt standing around the campfire singing and talking.
- At that event, one shared how wonderful it was to be able to listen to the speaker, knowing that many others were watching out for their young daughter as she ran around with the other kids present.
- Feeling a sense of belonging was a member's first experience helping plan and prepare for a temple event. They experienced such a sense of connection as they worked side by side with others.

Engagement is an important pathway to belonging. I hope each of you will take a moment to think about a time you felt that you truly belonged in our TBO family, and I encourage you to look for ways to engage with our community. Come to services and stay for *oneg* so that we can get to know each other. Participate in our social events and have fun together. Join a committee, or work on an event so that you can feel that sense of being needed. Each of you has something to contribute to our community and we welcome you and your efforts.

Capital Campaign Lag BaOmer Celebration



More than 75 members enjoyed singing around a bonfire with **Noah Zeichner**, a catered lunch, and talks from **Rabbi Kort**, **Jim Dean** (Executive Director of the NW Washington Interfaith Alliance), and **Wanda Bresnick**. This included information about our history, present impact on the community, and future potential. **Sonia Siegel Vexler** told the story behind our Capital Campaign commemorative mezuzot, and pledging households received their beautiful mezuzah. Honorary Campaign Chair, **Rennie Karr**, shared exciting news with the community: TBO will receive a grant of \$250,000 from a Jewish philanthropic organization, bringing the total funds raised to date to just under \$2 million. Tzedakah Box

The April - June *Tzedakah* Box recipient is Everytown for Gun Safety Support Fund. This is an independent, nonpartisan 501(c)(3) organization that seeks to improve our understanding of the causes of gun violence and help to reduce it by conducting groundbreaking original research, developing evidence-based policies, and communicating gun safety knowledge to the American public. Two of their programs are:

- Everytown for Safer Cities provides grants and training for community-based violence intervention programs aimed at reducing gun violence in cities; and
- Be SMART a public education campaign which educates parents and other caregivers on secure gun storage to prevent children from accessing a gun.

The July - September *Tzedakah* Box recipient is Faith Action Network. Temple Beth Or is a member of this multi-faith partnership of over 160 faith communities around Washington state. The members of this nonprofit strive for a "just, compassionate, and sustainable world through community building, education and courageous public action."
