

We also continued our tradition of selecting the Religious School's annual *tzedakah* recipients. After a student vote, this year's recipients are: Mary's Place, Magen David Adom and Jewish National Fund.

Mary's Place provides shelter and support to families on their way out of homelessness. With the ongoing conflict in Israel, students recognized the important work of Magen David Adom, which provides first-responders with training, medical supplies and more. In honor of a fallen lone soldier and friend, the **Roth family** is matching that donation with a gift to Jewish National Fund. Since October 7, JNF's focus is to ensure that the needs of those who call the communities on the border with Gaza and with Lebanon home are met. JNF is known for community building, planting trees, education advocacy and more.

After *K'hilah*, families celebrated outdoors with bubbles, balloons and nosh. Thanks to **Anna Feigen** and helpers! The day ended with a heartfelt tribute to Noah and his 25 years of music for our school.

- All of our permits the overall building permit, the public works permit, and the building permit for the stormwater detention vault have been approved and issued by the City of Everett.
- CPM has started interior demolition and demolition of the two outbuildings. See photos on page 7.
- The electrical subcontractor has set up the temporary power to be used during construction.
- The rabbi's office is now the CPM superintendent's office.
- The design group has begun meeting with CPM to select appropriate budget-friendly options for our finishes.

#### Member-hosted Shabbat dinners

WHAT: Monthly Shabbat dinners in people's homes to celebrate Shabbat on the weeks there is no TBO service.

WHY: To build community, keep members engaged and connected during construction, and to strengthen relationships.

WHO: All TBO members are invited to be a host and/or a guest. Each Shabbat can be an independent event, having different hosts and guests. This is intended to be flexible and informal, not a *chavurah*.

The host will choose how many people to invite (adults only, families, multigenerational) and whether the meal is provided by the host, potluck, bring-yourown, or takeout. Guests will be assigned based on host and guest meal and configuration preferences, taking into consideration allergies and food restrictions.

#### Social Action Committee news

The *Tzedakah* Box recipient for April-June is the NAACP Legal Defense Fund, America's premier legal organization fighting for racial justice. Last year, in preparation for Passover, **Rabbi Kort** and TBO member **Reggie Melech Gillins** led a discussion about reparations for African Americans as a first step in repairing the devastation inflicted by slavery and



ongoing racial discrimination. Until there is a systematic way of providing reparations, consider a donation to the NAACP Legal Defense Fund. Donations can be placed in the portable *Tzedakah* Box at our offsite location, made online through the Temple Beth Or website, or directly at <a href="https://www.naacpldf.org">www.naacpldf.org</a>. If you have questions about reparations, Melech has said he is open to being contacted through email or phone.

#### June is Pride Month

Pride Month commemorates a time in our country's recent past when homosexuality was illegal, until (thanks in large part to a small, brave, determined and unrelenting group of drag queens at Stonewall in New York City) it wasn't.

In the face of whatever personal feelings we might each have about gender and sexuality, and in response to loud rhetoric in opposition to gay rights from some in our government, how do we genuinely and in good faith participate in Pride Month? What is our role in uplifting our LGBTQIA+ family, friends and neighbors? How do we add our voices to the call for rights, freedoms and equal justice for everyone on the rainbow continuum of humanity? Barbara Gittings, American author who some have called "The Mother of Gay Rights," wrote, "Equality means more than passing laws. The struggle is really won in the hearts and minds of the community, where it really counts."

Below are titles of some picture books that might open doors for family discussions and allow us to add our hearts and minds to the ongoing struggle for dignity, equality and justice for all. Many of these books are about acceptance in general (not specifically LGBTQIA+ issues), and most are available at independent bookstores, libraries, or as free audiobooks.

- Red: A Crayon's Story by Michael Hall (ages 5+)
- Glenn Burke, Game Changer by Phil Bildner (ages 7+)
- Pride: The Story of Harvey Milk and the Rainbow Flag by Rob Sanders (ages 7+)
- Stonewall: A Building. An Uprising. A Revolution by Rob Sanders (ages 8+)
- 47,000 Beads by Koja and Angel Adeyoha (ages 8+)

#### What is LIFE & LEGACY?

LIFE & LEGACY® is a partnership program which helps communities such as TBO build endowments to provide long-term stability and support to sustain Jewish life. LIFE & LEGACY encourages individuals to plan for afterlifetime giving. Periodically, we'll answer some questions about LIFE & LEGACY.

#### Do I need a will? I don't have one.

In general, everyone over 18 should have a will. This is especially important if you have minor children. For LIFE & LEGACY purposes, a will is not necessary. Most bank accounts, IRAs, investment accounts, life insurance policies and similar assets provide an option to name beneficiaries using percentages.

## I don't have any family, so I don't need to think about gift and estate planning.

If you have no heirs and you don't have a documented will or estate plan in place, there is a very good likelihood the state will become your de facto beneficiary. Few people like to think about their own death, yet it is important to review your assets and update your beneficiary plans throughout your lifetime.

#### Will asking for legacy gifts hurt our Capital Campaign?

There is no conflict between the two programs. The Capital Campaign is a drive to raise funds in a short time frame for the specific effort to update and improve our building and its accessibility. A LIFE & LEGACY gift is a pledge for the future, there is no due date, and for that reason, does not compete with the Capital Campaign's goals.

#### Why does TBO have a LIFE & LEGACY program?

TBO has always been careful to plan strategically for our future. Just as we work to build an improved permanent home for our congregation, we also want to ensure our long-term programming and community support are strong and stable. Best practices say that nonprofits today need the financial support of an endowment such as LIFE & LEGACY to be viable for the future.

## Leadership news

During the Governing Board meeting on May 4, 2025, the Board did the following:

- Sonia Siegel Vexler conducted a Life & Legacy training session.
- Voted to recommend approval by the general membership of the 2025-26 budget as presented by the Finance Committee.
- Considered the creation of a "Tree of Life" type artwork in our remodeled building honoring all donors to the Capital Campaign.
- Discussed, offered support, and thanked organizers for the upcoming fundraisers: a waffle brunch and silent auction on June 1 and the annual donor dinner on June 21.
- Planned the semiannual membership meeting that will take place virtually at 10:00 am on Sunday, June 8, and will include the opportunity to vote on the 2025-26 budget.
- Approved the recommendation of the Finance Committee to adopt the following policy: "The signatures of two authorized financial account signers is required on checks over the amount of \$2,500. Payments over the amount of \$2,500 may be made electronically from a Temple financial account if one authorized financial account signer approves and signs the invoice to be paid and the payment is made by another authorized financial account signer."
- Agreed that publishing two *ORacles* this summer instead of one would help keep the community connected. There is no printing cost as it is distributed electronically.

- *Tikkun olam* transforming ourselves and our world through *tzedakah* (fairness), social justice, and *g'milut chasadim* (acts of loving kindness).
